NEWSLETTER Issue 2

It has been a while since the last newsletter so there is much to talk about. In January 2015 we applied for a grant under the Government's Roof Repair Scheme and were very fortunate in being successful. The grant was specifically to replace slipped and missing slates, refurbish rainwater goods and improve low level drainage around the base of the entire building. The work began in the Autumn of 2015 and was finally completed in the Spring of 2017

St Breaca Church is a Grade 1 Listed Building so any work undertaken whether interior or exterior is subject to strict rules and regulations and before any work can be undertaken a FACULTY must be obtained. This process involves submitting an application with detailed information on the materials to be used and who will carry out the work. The work can only begin once this permission is granted. For instance only cast iron may be used for the hoppers, downpipes and guttering. This was in a very bad state and most of it was replaced.

The Roof Repair Project

The project took over a year to complete and began with the removal of the existing clay drainage channels around the church. A mini digger was brought in to excavate a deeper channel around the base of the building and a new system using perforated pipes laid on a membrane and topped with granite chippings has been installed in its place. It is hoped this will more effectively discharge rainwater and surface water and take it away from the base of the church. The interior level of the church is considerably below that of the exterior. This new system should ensure that the inside of the building remains less damp than it was originally.



A mini digger was used to excavate the drainage channels. A perforated pipe system was installed.



At the same time the exterior wall in the north aisle was repointed using lime mortar. This lay outside the scope of the roof project, so the cost of this was supported by just over £1.500 from the Friends and a grant of £2,500 from the Allchurches Trust. It was a good opportunity to have this work undertaken whilst the contractors were on site. The area is where the most significant of the church's wall paintings are situated and the work needed to be done before planned restoration work to the paintings was due to start later in the Spring of 2017.



All inappropriate cementitious mortar needed to be removed and the joints raked out in preparation for the lime pointing. Cement does not allow a stone building to breathe whereas lime mortar enables any moisture to evaporate naturally. The final stage of the roof project was completed at the beginning of March 2017 with the replacement of the flat lead roof to the porch in the South Transept. The original lead sheeting dates back to 1770 and was the thickest lead that the roofing contractors had ever seen. There was some delay in finding a suitable contractor to carry out the work as it is very specialised. The work has been carried out to a very high standard and should hopefully ensure that this particular roof will last for a considerable time.



Removing the existing lead sheet proved difficult as it was very thick. It had to be cut into manageable pieces so that it could be removed.
